CAMPUS & COMMUNITY

Penn Charter has a long history of access and, in its fourth century, is more diverse than ever.

An urban school located on a 47-acre, green campus in the East Falls neighborhood of Philadelphia, Penn Charter is just five miles from the business and cultural resources of one of the nation's largest and most complex cities. Our Center for Public Purpose, built on a rich tradition of service, engages PC students in community-based work addressing some of the city's most pressing social issues.

The school seeks to enroll young people of diverse faiths, races, backgrounds and talents. Families reside in 106 zip codes, across county and state lines and in heterogeneous neighborhoods throughout Philadelphia. More than a third of our students receive financial aid; more than a quarter identify as people of color. Buddhism, Catholicism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Protestantism, Quakerism and more are represented.



SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

Founded in 1689 by William Penn and the Religious Society of Friends, and operating under three charters granted by Penn, Penn Charter is the oldest Quaker school in the world.

- Admission is highly selective and determined by school record, standardized test scores, a personal interview and teacher recommendations.
- Pre-K to 12 enrollment: 988 students, from 106 zip codes
- Upper School enrollment: 439, with 110 students in the Class of 2022. Nearly 30 percent of Upper School students are people of color.
- Penn Charter will spend \$5.8 million on financial aid in 2021-22. Forty-eight percent of Upper School students receive financial aid.
- Upper School faculty: 92
- Average Upper School class size: 16. Student-teacher ratio: 8:1
- Student conduct is guided by an Honor Code.
- Students reflect in Quaker Meeting for Worship each week.

GRADING

- Passing grades range from A to D-. F denotes failure.
- Students may take any fifth, non-required elective on a pass/fail basis. P denotes passing.
- **HONORS:** an individual semester GPA of 3.0 with no grade lower than a B-.
- **HIGH HONORS:** an individual semester GPA of 3.65 with no grade lower than a B-.
- Penn Charter does not rank students, weight course grades or report GPA.

CUM LAUDE SOCIETY

Founded in 1906, the Cum Laude Society is dedicated to honoring scholastic achievement in secondary schools; Penn Charter was one of the original seven schools invited to join. A few students are inducted at the end of junior year but most inductees receive recognition in spring of senior year.

COVID EXPERIENCE 2020-21

Following the Covid guidelines of the Philadelphia Department of Public Health, Penn Charter reduced the number of students on campus by dividing each Upper School grade into two cohorts that alternated weekly between on-campus and virtual instruction. Clubs, performing arts and athletic experiences were offered within Covid guidelines and were limited in nature and access. In May and June, the classes of 2022, 2023 and 2024 received full on-campus instruction for the first time since March 2020.

CURRICULUM FEATURES

CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

Two certificate programs – one in Global Studies and one in Environmental Stewardship & Sustainability – offer engaged students the opportunity to integrate different aspects of the Upper School program around a particular focus and passion in their junior and senior years. The main components of certificate work are approved coursework, major projects, minimum number of hours of activity credit, and a Senior Comprehensive Project. Enrollment requires faculty approval. A completed certificate demonstrates high academic achievement and is awarded during graduation ceremonies.

ADVANCED COURSES AND AP COURSES

Enrollment in **Advanced courses** requires faculty approval. Advanced coursework in the visual arts is also available for qualified students.

Due to the structured nature of the freshman and sophomore year curriculum, students typically do not have the opportunity to take **Advanced Placement** courses until their junior year. Enrollment in these courses requires faculty approval.

Science: Students must complete a three-year sequence in order to graduate: Biology or Advanced Biology in 9th grade, Chemistry or Advanced Chemistry in 10th grade, and Physics, Advanced Physics, or Earth and Space Sciences in 11th or 12th grades.

INDEPENDENT STUDY & SYMPOSIUM

Qualified students may opt to take independent study courses in subjects not covered in the curriculum. They present their work at an annual Symposium attended by teachers, classmates and guests. Independent study courses may not be used to fulfill graduation requirements and must be approved by the student's parent, advisor, the department head involved and the director of Upper School.

SENIOR COMPREHENSIVE PROJECT

The Senior Comprehensive Project (SCP) provides students the opportunity to participate in a program that integrates traditional academic disciplines with "real world" settings, issues and topics. It is required and occurs during May of senior year. During the SCP, students work approximately 20 hours per week, read related material, maintain a daily journal, and make a final presentation to the Upper School community.

ONE SCHOOLHOUSE

When students exhaust the curriculum offerings in a particular discipline, they are able to access more advanced courses through One Schoolhouse, a nonprofit accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

MINI-COURSES

Mini-Courses are 8-week seminars where students meet twice a week for two hours after school to learn about a topic not currently offered in-depth in our curriculum. These are enrichment courses and listed on the transcript; no credit is given toward graduation and they are pass/fail.

ARTS, ATHLETICS & CLUBS

Arts and Athletics are cocurricular programs, engaging every student at points in their high school career. Upper School has four visual arts studios, including a digital lab, plus an IdeaLab makerspace. Almost 300 students are active in the performing arts; Upper School offers 17 instrumental and choral ensembles and theater productions in a 650-seat theater. Penn Charter competes in the Inter-Academic League; founded in 1887, the Inter-Ac is the oldest interscholastic athletic league in the United States. The PC Quakers field 18 sports. Nearly 40 student-led and student-inspired clubs provide exploration in a range topics, including cultural identity, food security, environmental stewardship, ethical behavior, micro-finance, service, social justice, student publications and more.
