

In the years to come we shall recall our days at school, and the memories will be pleasant ones.






WILLIAM S. LANE

The line was composed offensively of Hynes, Schaufler, and Graff at ends; Goetz and Happe at tackles; Captain Wells and Torg at guards; and Colehower at center. Bart Hanlon handled the ball, while Bob Meyer, Rammy Mc Laughlin, Deke Conklin, John Budd, Frank Pigage, and Bill Matthews carried it.

An excellent defensive line was composed of Torg in the middle and Happe, Goetz, and Wells at tackles. Defensive ends Dick Graff and Paul Hynes rounded out what was one of the best forward walls in the league. Mc Laughlin, George Lear, Chuck McIlvaine, and Budd were the backer-ups. Tony Wall, Pigage, Bill Harvey, and Conklin were halfbacks, while Meyer filled the safety slot. Dick Geyer did the kicking off, Drew Schaufler handled the punting, and Pete Greer booted the extra points. Dick Daugherty, Jack Walp, Phil Pfatteicher, Ev Hoffman, Chuck Clayton, and John Taggart made up the rest of the squad.

To be additionally congratulated are Bob Meyer and Joe Happe, who made the All-Interac first team, while Rammy McLaughlin, John Wells, Paul Hynes, and Joe Torg, made the second team. Hanlon and Lear received honorable mention.

This year's soccer team was perhaps the best in the history of the school. Led by the brilliant play of Co-Captains Lyons and Maier, the team went on to win for the school its first undisputed Inter-Academic Soccer Championship since 1932, chalking up a league record of five wins and one tie, and an overall record of eleven wins and three ties in regular season play.

This remarkable record was attained not only by the spirit, skill, and hard play of the team, but also by the unceasing loyalty and devotion which coaches, Conard and Linton showed towards their job. They molded the players into a fine defensive and offensive team, which went into every game with a tremendous desire to win. When it was behind, it never gave up till the last whistle.

We opened the season by defeating a determined but inexperienced West Philadelphia team, 9-0. Co-Captain Lyons had a field day, scoring five goals. This game was followed by easy victories over Abington High, 3-1, North Wales, 5-0, and Olney, 6-0. Co-Captain Maier carried the scoring burden in these three

games with a total of nine goals. Against Lower Merion we were held to a 1-1 tie, Dick Weeder scoring our only point.

Our regular season opened with a 4-0 victory over Friends Central. The all important Haverford game which followed proved to be the game which decided the Championship, for Haverford finished second to us in the final league standings. We won, 2-0.

The game with Germantown Friends was the most hard fought of the season. They used an eight-man defense and played for the tie. We threatened often, but even after two five-minute overtime periods the score remained 0-0. The next week we downed a mediocre Episcopal squad, 5-0.

A powerful Westtown team played us to a 0-0 tie. Following our victory over George School, we defeated Germantown Academy, 4-0, and Friends Select, 6-0. For the first time in twenty-one years Penn Charter had won the Championship!





For the third successive year Duke Taylor led the basketball team to the Interac Championship. The team had an overall record of 19 wins and 4 losses, and a league record of 10 wins and no defeats.

We started the season with a determined mind to overcome all opposition, swamping Ocean City High, 61-25, with Schaufler getting 23 points and Hynes, 16. We defeated Swarthmore's J.V.'s, 55-33, and Lower Merion, 63-55. In these two games "Tall" Paul Hynes scored 44 points.

We then met undefeated Lincoln High. Lincoln's 14-point lead in the first quarter proved too much for us to overcome, and we lost, 71-60, despite Schaufler's 30 points.

Simon Gratz's challenge resulted in our 83-68 victory, Schaufler scoring 31 points. In the next two games we were below par, losing to West Philadelphia, 47-40, and

defeating P.S.D., 55-38.

In our first league game Schaufler and Kohler, with 18 and 17 points respectively, sparked us to a 55-44 win over G.A. Against Haverford we squeezed through with an overtime win, 44-41, Schaufler again leading with 20 points. We then defeated Episcopal, 47-39. Though our opponents held Schaufler to one point, Kohler with 19 and Hynes with 18 took up the slack. The team then traveled to West Point, where the Plebes won, 66-53.

Returning to league competition, we swamped Malvern, 62-42. In this game Schaufler tied the league record with 40 points, setting a new school record. George School then lost to us, 52-33. The next league game was with Friends Central, who were beaten, 57-39. Schaufler and Hynes led the attack with 19 and 18 points. The fine defensive play of McIlvaine held "All-

Interac" Buckley to eleven points.

The second half of the schedule began with the defeat of G.A., 54-48, Schaufler as usual furnishing the inspiration to his teammates.

We then went out to the Main Line to play Haverford. We edged through with a two-point win, 55-53. When there was less than a minute to go, Schaufler fouled out. The Fords tied the game, and all was gloom, upon which Meyer sank two fouls to put us ahead, and as the gun sounded, Haverford took a shot which just missed.

Episcopal then came over and put on a freeze. The first quarter ended, P.C. leading, 6-5. At game end we were still ahead, 31-24.

The next two games were non-league encounters — a win over Girard, 52–29, and over P.M.C. 54–43. We played next in Malvern's "match box" court, winning, 55–32. The last league game was a 56–48 win over Friends Central.

The team gave Duke a fine present on his retirement by beating the Alumni in a very close game, 48-46. The next day, we played the Penn J.V.'s at the Palestra. Though Hynes had a field day with 26 points, we lost 70-54.

This year's starting team consisted of Schaufler at center, Kohler and Meyer at guard, and McIlvaine and Hynes at forward. In recognition of their fine play, Schaufler and Hynes were named to the first team "All-Interac", with McIlvaine, Meyer, and Kohler getting honorable mention.

The members of the starting team were hard pressed for their berths by Hanlon, Maier, Joyce, Allen, Budd, Smith, and Geyer.

For 22 years, Duke has been producing outstanding basketball teams. He has won 15 championships, adding further distinction to our athletic tradition.



The timekeeper blew his horn, signaling the end of Co-Captain Deke Conklin's championship match at the Episcopal Invi-Deke's championship, tation Tournament. along with those won by Co-Captain George McLaughlin, Dan Furman, and Ted Gorman, helped Penn Charter to retain a position second only to the Haverford wrestling team, and gave P.C. a lion's share of the twelve individual championships for which eight different teams were competing. 
Fencing

Following Bill, was our noble president-to-be, one Richard-I-Know-She-Loves-Me Fisher, who was to fight more cold wars, and I mean COLD, in Ocean City and the nation's capitol than any two divisions in Korea.

Dick-Thrill-of-a-Romance Graff and his buddy Robert-If-You-Guys-Can't-Stop-Talking-I Can-Stand-Here-As-Long-As-You-Can Wilson followed shortly. Bob was convinced that he was the debutantes' delight. If only a few debutantes were convinced, he would be all set. You can have 'em, Bob.

We also get Peter Arndt in sixth grade, fresh from the campus of Chestnut Hill Academy. Classes started, and at about eleven o'clock who should stagger in but Tony Who-Turned-Out the-Lights Wall. Tony was never known for his promptness, and every test day he could usually be found in the infirmary. We learned quite a bit that year.



In the seventh grade wriggling Bob Adams and Dangerous Bill Bux were the first to cross the threshhold and join our humble but proud class. Danny Furman then amazed us all by entering without opening the door. How did he do it? Simple. He just walked under it. The next guy to join us came to school, I think just to heckle Mr. McVey in American History. He did a good job of it, too. Nice going, Gene. The year's newcomers were completed after Phil-Ewell-Blackwell Lippincott and Snowden Rockey, alias Lamont Cranston, turned in their contracts.





Eighth grade began as seventh grade had. Don Baumann, the ideal first baseman, and Bill Ilko, the ideal, made their way through the weeds and into our room. Along about this time we noticed one of the faculty, who we fater fearned was Dr. Sweet, rolfing a silk carpet out to the door. He then went from one end to the other throwing orchids before him. Having done this, he then stationed two centurions at the door, each with a lyre. They stood there for ten minutes and then began to play very sweetly. That is not a pun. We ran to see what the event was and saw Frank Pigage walking majestically forward to our room.

The next mortal to seek admittance to our class was one Glen-Hand-Shaker Stassen, who started to list the merits of the Republican Party. Don't you know that you cannot list that which does not exist, Glen? That caused many a good argument.

In the ninth grade we added six more names to our class. Fighting Jack Coppolino and George Graham, who took time out from his training with the Phils to come to school, were the first to attend school in September.

Our next acquaintance was straight from the F.B.I. He was Philip Pfatteicher, our flying G man, and he didn't stand for any nonsense. Number six entered in the person of Clark Riley, who is living proof that if a Republican will shut his mouth and use his head he will vote Democratic.

In tenth grade we came together and began to discuss the events of the summer, when we heard a flurry of wings, a chorus of "Take to the air, Junior Birdmen," and John Wells alighted in the doorway with a lollypop, a straw hat with a streamer, and a pair of Mary Jane sandals.

We could tell that the next guy had a mouth if nothing else. His lower jaw was a prime example of perpetual motion. Nothing understandable ever came out, though. Ed Veit, combination sparring partner and history wizard, joined us as did Norman-Give-Us-Your-Blessing and quiet Jack Bryant. Pom Pom Palmer, the pixie from Pounce Pounce, and Larry Buck, the left-handed Dizzy Dean, also popped in on us. Lanky Ed Maier, the scourge of the Inter-Ac League (and lover of eggs) came in, and so did Dick Johnson, who opposed Glen Stassen in the battle for her hand.











This brings us up to our final year, twelfth grade.

This was one year the alumni got smashed in the face in a number of ways. Some people never get out of the sixth grade. This year we also were honored by a visit from that witty Austrian Ambassador, Guenther Pernhaupt. He made some priceless observations on American girls. After Guenther came the Central flash, Joe Torg, who ought to put ketchup on his hand before giving out samples.

Following Joe was sociable Tall-Paul Hynes, who won the heart of all who knew him. We were in the act of surveying the present newcomers when we heard a loud speaker blare forth with "Clear the runway for flight 34." We all stepped aside and made room for the junior birdmen and squadron leader, Chuck McIlvaine.

Rammy Bill McLaughlin came next and was immediately approached by Mr. Faber.

A smooth operator by the name of Elliot then entered our abode and after joining chorus always pushed ahead of everybody else in a concert and grabbed the cutest girl. Ed Michener joined our class in this year. It was nothing new to Ed, who had been around the circuit before. Ed always said he was a natural. It was when someone asked, "a natural what?" that there was a difference of opinion.

Last but not least came Chico De La Torre, fresh off the banana boat from Equador, who added that South American touch.

That is it. I think we have a pretty good class as classes go. Since we so logically began at the beginning let us now end at the end. Consider it done . . .
