




Foreword



The Class of 1962 is saddened by the loss of its friend and mentor, Mr. Henry J. Heine, who died suddenly on June 23, 1961. Only fifty-nine, Mr. Heine had served both as a teacher of German in the Senior School and as Director of Athletics at Penn Charter for thirty-three years. Mr. Heine was an institution in himself at Penn Charter. He was known as the faculty wit and was always ready to help or advise one of his students. As Director of Athletics he imparted a jovial atmosphere to the Gym Office, while stimulating respect both for himself and for Penn Charter. He is gone, but will long be remembered.





P.C. traveled to Haverford to open Interac competition. With several valuable players out, Charter fought a close one, only to lose again 6-13.







On Tuesday, September 6, about thirty-five well-tanned, out-of-shape soccer players began practice for the forthcoming season. By September 19, the day of the Olney game, Coach Conard had forged a team of sixteen determined, enthusiastic players. The team lost that game 1-3, and in the succeeding games with Haverford, G.F.S., and Episcopal, the three best teams in the league, the young Charter squad was defeated, to a large extent by superior experience.

Then on October 3, in the rain, the Blue and Yellow scored five times against G.A. for our first win by a score of 5-3. On the next Thursday, overconfidence induced Charter to underestimate C.H.A.'s ability, and the score ended up 1-1. A traditionally strong Westtown team defeated us 2-0 in one of the team's better games, but we rebounded a week later with a 5-2 victory over Friends Central on October 17. The highlight of the game was Paul Sigel's hat-trick, the only one of the season.

The next game, at Haverford, on October 19, was the highlight of the season. Haverford, previously unbeaten, lost at the feet of the hustling, determined team from Penn Charter. With the score tied 1-1 in the fourth quarter Captain Steve Simpson broke loose and flipped a shot past Haverford's goalie to score the winning goal. The rest of the season was rather anti-climactic as the team couldn't "get up" as high for the succeeding games as they had for the Haverford game.

The next game, at G.F.S., we lost 4-3, spending the whole game trying to catch up. Episcopal scored late in the last quarter to beat us 2-1, and on October 31, Charter played Moorestown Friends to a 1-1 tie.

In November the team first beat G.A. 2-0 and lost to C.H.A. 1-0. On November 14, Charter finished the 1961 campaign with a 2-0 victory over Friends Central.



A green squad started the current basketball season, with the notable exceptions of Captain Lin Scarlett, Interac high scorer Bill Soens, and returning lettermen Steve Probst and Tom Sloan. Victories over Friends Central (74-57) and Germantown Academy (73-45.) closed the first half of the Interac season.

The team went on to repeat their victories in the second half of the season: Chestnut Hill (62-39); Haverford (71-64); Episcopal (55-47); Friends Central (71-51); and Germantown Academy (60-52). As this goes to the printer a victory over Malvern is all that keeps Penn Charter from the championship.





With the promising material aforementioned, coaches Conard and Faber can look forward to a winning season.


