


Foreword


The Penn Charter Community

Cum Laude


The Cum Laude Society was founded in 1906. Modeled after Phi Beta Kappa, the Society was originated in order to encourage and reward scholastic achievement on the secondary school level. The founder, Dr. Abraham W. Harris, reflected his hopes in the Society's motto, "Excellence, Justice, Honor." 




Dramatic Club




The Greek Society maintains a low membership, thus enabling it to hold frequent evening meetings in the homes of mem-





Penn Charter News



Science Club





Upper School Council


A second and equally important phase of the Senior Council is our newly formed Honor System, which has just completed its third successful year. It is the Council's feeling that an Honor System is only as




Webster Society




Football

This year's team had an intense desire to win the championship and make up for last year's poor season.




alternated with Bill at fullback. Dave Coward, Honorable Mention All-Interac, and Dick Deats played fine defensive ball all year.










Soccer




Gym






Squash






Wrestling






To climax an excellent season, we placed high at the Episcopal Invitational Tournament with Bob Jones being chosen Most Valuable Wrestler.




Many excellent individual records have been established this year. The 200 yd. freestyle relay team (Steve Schade,


These boys are: Pete Schuler and Bill Schroeder in the hurdles; Varick Martin in the sprints;







Golf
