
DEDICATION






Class Advisor


The Club took one trip this year to Independence Hall and the surrounding historical spots in Philadelphia. By discussing the past, the boys receive insight into the present and the future.



The magazine is the medium literary expression for the student body. It prints prose (fiction and non-fiction), poetry, and art, and generally encourages, the free expression of the students in writing.


With the same determined spirit (and a few more contributions) the P.C. Magazine will continue to be a source of pride to the entire school.


The Science Club gives seriously interested students a chance to experiment in, and learn more about the field of science. This year's membership was the largest in many years.



The Wheel Club is a relatively new society at school. It is composed of boys who are mechanically inclined and who know what's happening when it comes to automobiles.






The Mirror has progressed from a mimeographed sheet to a printed format complete with pictures. This newspaper has become a vital part of the awareness of the Penn Charter student.





The final game of the season, against old rival Germantown Academy, proved the superiority of our team as they sprinted to a 20-0 win.


The 1965-66 Football team was one of the school's best and attained that standing by hard work and practice. They ask only one thing in return: that the next varsity team beats Haverford!

SQUASH







This year's Wrestling team showed good potential, in spite of graduations of last year's men—Palmer, Cook, Zimmer, and DeLong.



BASEBALL



Without making predictions too early in the season, the varsity squad this year is a determined, talented group. Mr. McMillan is anxious to take P.C. to another league title.






TRACK



GOLF


With the loss of only two lettermen from last year's Interac championship team, the 1966 Golf team has its eyes set on another league championship.
