Class History

1955 was a good year for Penn Charter. The Football Team won its first champion-ship since 1932, the Basketball Team was on its way to its thirteenth league crown, and the Class of 1967 had entered First Grade. Ten members of the present class—Griff Affel, Ronnie Brenner, Bob Buckley, Harry Cherken, Butch Heine, Ken Klinger, Joe Picardo, Bruce Richman, Gary Rosenau, and Pat Waltz—came in kindergarten in '54, and five more—Chris Allen, Mike Markovitz, Gary Partenheimer, Eli Saleeby, and Ray Wysoczanski—were added in '55.

The Gym Team began its second season in 1956, and Dave Scanlon came to Penn Charter. A year later Scott Kulicke, Don Leopold, Jack Muldoon, Charles Stretch, and John White joined the class.

The founding of the Art Society in 1958 attracted Jean Myers to P.C. the following year, along with Bruce Berlinger, Terry Cushmore, Rich Green, and Mike Ross. Dave Pasterchik jumped into our class in the middle of the year. With the Class of '67 in Fifth Grade, Gary Partenheimer was President of the Junior School Council, assisted by Secretary Jack Muldoon and Representative Bob Buckley. This year the Penn Charter Honor System was formulated in Mr. Lane's senior English class.

1960-61 brought championships in basketball and tennis to P.C. and five new members of the Class of '67: Carl Haeussler, Alan Hedges, Reynolds Long, Bill Safrin, and Chris Scott.

Fourteen new students—Jim Armour, Mike Cherry, Greg Conrad, Bruce Dunn, Chick Goodman, Walt Graff, Mark Hankin, Bob Hendricks, Bill Lightfoot, Sandy McAdoo, Ed Merves, Dennis Petrillo, Fred Schofield, and Julian Wessell—entered the class in Seventh Grade, the largest group of any year.

In 1962-63, the schedule was changed to eight periods per day, with each class shortened from 50 minutes to 40 or 45. Short recess gained a minute, and Blocks 7 and 8 were born. Sandy McAdoo played his first year of varsity squash, but the team's dual defeat of Episcopal was overshadowed by championships in football and baseball. Dave Fitch, Gary Friel, Scott Miller, Mark Mumford, and Bruce Nicholson joined the class.

1963—64 marked the 275th anniversary of the William Penn Charter School, commemorated by an all-day conference with Friends Select, and celebrated by an undefeated, untied football team. P.C. also won championships in basketball, baseball, and golf. The freshman year of the Class of '67 brought thirteen new students: John Blumenthal, Kurt Dengler, Dave Duff, Fred Eckfeldt, Bill Gawthrop, Bob Haley, Paul Harrington, Tom Lane, Tom Oxtoby, Gary Palmer, John Skinner, Andy Smith, and Jake Stone. The completion of the building additions gave Mr. Lane a carpeted homeroom and provided a well-equipped biology lab for the new BSCS course. A small group of students printed the first *P.C. Mirror*, an 8-page dittoed newspaper. Ecki Stohlmann, from Germany, was the first exchange student sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee, and the Swimming Team came into existence.

Bob Baer, Jim Coon, Paul Kingsberry, Chase Kneeland, and Dave Still entered P.C. in the sophomore year, just in time for Mr. Shakespeare's new public speaking course. A cross-country team was born in the fall of 1964, and the golf team took another championship in the spring of '65. Jack Muldoon was elected Treasurer of the Class of '67, and Mr. Ralph O. Evans was chosen as Class Adviser.

The million-dollar Activities Building was dedicated in November, 1965, shortly before a convincing grid victory over G.A. Dave Icenhower, John Knox, Tom Mc-

Glinn, Neil Smith, Charlie Lachman, Chris Swartley, and Mike Tracy entered the class as juniors in a year of Friends Meeting controversy, Final Exam Exemption, and the promise of a new library. Mark Hankin spent the year in Germany as an exchange student to Martino-Katharineum in Braunschweig.

In the spring of 1966, member of the Class of '67 began to fill the positions of school leadership for the coming year. Six students—Sandy McAdoo, Paul Harrington, Mike Cherry, Gary Partenheimer, John White, and Don Leopold—were elected to Trident. Ed Merves took over the Presidency of Community Government. Editor-inchief Partenheimer, literary editor Coon, and business manager Blumenthal began the large task of compiling the 1967 Class Record. The Class had already achieved academic distinction with high scores on the March SAT's and eight 800's by six different boys on the May Achievement Tests. Several other 800's were added in senior Achievements. Mike Cherry and Tom Oxtoby, the two highest ranking students in the class, were elected to Cum Laude at the end of the year. Led by class officers McAdoo (President), Harrington (Vice-President), Cherry (Secretary), and Muldoon (Treasurer), the Class of 1967 accepted the Stairs at the Farewell Assembly in May 1966, and officially reached the top of the school after Commencement on June 15.

1966-67 was a year of great progress and achievement at Penn Charter, led by the Senior Class. The class was completed by Paul Grimes, Doug Thomas, and Lars Eklöf, a visitor from Sweden. The recently remodeled Henry C. Evans Lab housed the new ESCP Earth Science course, and ten seniors took the new College Biology course.

Eight Seniors were named National Merit Finalists, and 10 more received Letters of Commendation. Mike Cherry and Mike Ross later became Merit Scholars.

The Student Council had an active year examining the Honor System through open discussion, assemblies, and newspaper articles. Tom Oxtoby chaired an Honor System Evaluation Committee which interviewed faculty and students and presented a list of recommendations to the Council. Other accomplishments were the Charities Drive, rearrangement of assembly seating, formation of a Spirit Committee, and purchase of a soda machine.

In November the Trident Society elected eight new members—Jim Coon, Bob Buckley, Dave Still, Ed Merves, Tom Oxtoby, Mike Ross, Mark Hankin, and Chris Scott—bringing the total to fourteen, the largest group in many years. Cum Laude honored nine additional seniors in March.

Dave Still was elected Chairman of the Dinner-Dance Committee, and Mark Hankin, Ed Merves, and Mike Cherry organized a program of Senior Seminars to replace finals.

Captain Sandy McAdoo completed his P.C. squash career as the top schoolboy player in the country, and Dave Icenhower was a nation champion in wrestling. The Golf Team and Baseball Team won Interac championships.

As the year draws to a close, the Seniors—after surviving Advanced Placement Tests and Commencement practice—look ahead to next year. The impressive list of future colleges includes Harvard, Princeton, Dartmouth, Yale, Amherst, Haverford, Cornell, Penn, Duke and others.

The graduation of the Class of 1967 marks the end of an era at Penn Charter, but it is hoped that each member of the class will gratefully remember his years at P.C., and that every remaining student will acknowledge the significant contributions of our class to the school.








'67 Class Record Is Better Than Ever

Community Government Reviews Honor System




Well-Fed Trident Continues Tradition




History Club Revises Its Power Structure




The Quakers Dozen

Varsity Club Builds Men








Wilson Society Dabbles In Current Affairs



Mr. Conard Retires After 19 Years As Coach

With only three lettermen returning, coaches Conard and Harrison formed a spirited team of seasoned Second Team veterans and young J.V. stars. P.C. won the opening game against West Catholic, 2-0, then lost to Kimberton in a thunderstorm, 3-2, and to Friends Select, 0-2, before winning their first league game over Malvern, 4-0.

Here the season-long string of injuries began. Dengler and Captain Skinner succumbed to sickness; Ward and Lightfoot had muscle problems; Merves brokes his nose with a face trap; and Schmidt broke his leg for the second year in a row.

A squad of only 11 men lost at Valley Forge, 3-0, but the team retaliated with a 4-0 win over Philmont. P.C. then lost to GFS, 1-2, on a disputed goal and dropped a game to Moorestown, 0-6.

Two second-half goals gave the team a 2-2 tie with powerful G.A. in a game which coach Conard noted as the best of the season. After another 2-2 tie with Chestnut Hill, P.C. lost to Haverford, 4-1. A last minute goal gave Swarthmore's J.V. a 1-0 victory despite outstanding play by goalie Bev Stanley and the P.C. defense.

The team then lost to superior Episcopal, 0-4, and to larger Westtown, 1-5, before thumping Friends Central, 4-1, to close out a 4-9-2 season. In a post-season hockey game, P.C. beat Abington Friends, 2-1, on goals by Partenheimer and Shelley.

P.C. finished sixth in the Interac with a 2-4-2 log. Kurt Dengler and Chris Scott were named to the Second Team. Skinner, Lane, and Fiechter received Honorable Mention.

At the banquet, Scott received the MVP award; Dengler was Most Improved Veteran and Fiechter Most Improved Rookie. Statistics showed Partenheimer was high point man with four goals and three assists, while Scott and Lightfoot also had four goals apiece.

Mr. Conard received a standing ovation (and a pipe) when he announced his retirement as head coach after 19 years of service. Mr. Harrison will be the new head coach, assisted by Ward and Schmidt, next year's co-captains.








Wrestling Team Has Best Season In Twelve Years





Baseball Team Fields Talented Veterans


