There are certain values which stand out in the history of an institution. Soon, you will be OPCs, graduates of Penn Charter. If the Class of 1985 follows the pattern of the past, class members will treasure the teaching strength of the faculty, and the diversity of the school program and population as central values of Penn Charter. This Class Record acknowledges the tradition of fine teaching by dedicating the volume to an outstanding teacher and underlines the prominence of diversity by making that characteristic the central theme of the entire volume.

The composition of the student body represents one vital element in the diversity of Penn Charter. As I meet with parents considering enrolling their children in the school, I am often told of a goal of having students in an academically stimulating and challenging environment within which the individual will grow with other talented students whose backgrounds may be quite different. Clearly, the major religious traditions in our country are well represented at Penn Charter. It is not unusual over a period of time to hear comments in Meeting for Worship reflecting a Catholic, Protestant, or Jewish perspective. A tuition assistance program provides partial support to over 20% of the upper school students to enable individuals of limited means to attend Penn Charter. The school's abiltiy to attract students from a wide geographic area adds another quality to the student body. Also, the encouraging of applicants from a variety of racial and ethnic origins enriches the educational community.

The diverse backgrounds of students in the class which contributes to the overall theme of the Class Record fits well within the philosophical traditions of Penn Charter. William Penn recognized the importance of educational opportunities for a variety of youngsters in the early days of schooling in Philadelphia. The charters under which the school now operates mention the education of students from a variety of backgrounds in-

cluding education without charge for qualified students who could not afford the fees.

One goal which leads to a diversified program at Penn Charter is the desire to develop each individual's talents to the fullest extent possible during the elementary and secondary years. A wide variety of offerings in the various departments speaks to those individual interests and talents while providing a strong foundation in the disciplines which form the basis of the liberal arts tradition. The athletic program offers sports from the most competitive team sport to outdoor education activities. During your years in the upper school, you have seen an increase in offerings in the arts including an expansion of the music program.

The valuing of diversity within the school community springs in part from the Quaker belief that there is that of God in every person. From that basic assumption, a natural consequence educationally is to nurture the God-given spark in each person so that he or she might reach full potential. Also, the school believes that we each need to test our ideas and values while developing with others who come from a different perspective. Finally, since intellectual development to central to Penn Charter, we wish to provide the richest academic environment possible without the artificial limitations of financial status or ethnic background.

Each of you must decide over the years if this educational philosophy has served you well, for it is the school's hope that we have helped to prepare you for the rich diversity that you will find beyond the school and that you will reach out to embrace that diversity in later life in a manner that will lead to a more fulfilling life for you and for all in the community.

That ideal has in many cases been reached in your final year at Penn Charter as individual classmates have helped to enrich the total experience of the class. Different moments stand out to each of us in the fabric of the year:

Geoff Kanter's solo at the Christmas program,

Joe Livezey's untiring efforts in the assembly room,

Chris Morton's tackling and leadership on the football field,

Zach Levine as Count Dracula,

Kenny Gerber's observations in the *Mirror*.

In these cases and in many others, individuals with diverse interests, talents, and backgrounds have enhanced the quality of the year for all of us by developing their own gifts within the context of the entire community.




college recommendation.




This dedication is a means of giving thanks to someone who has helped us through one of the most difficult times of our lives. Mr. Dresden, we will never forget your bright optimism,


Russian Trip


William J. Goulding




Lisa Klein


Ann Seitz-Brown







Nan Ottenstein


CLUBS








can keep you down!!












Mock Election/Debate
