# A Student's Perspective

## Of Penn Charter Over Three Centuries

On this, the three hundredth anniversary of the founding of the William Penn Charter School, we all find ourselves turning our minds to the past. Few learning institutions can claim that they were founded in the seventeenth century. This means that Penn Charter belongs to an auspicious group and is highly respected throughout the educational world. As a result, all the members of the Penn Charter community can feel a special pride when thinking of our school.

When I was asked to write a short history of the school for the *Class Record*, I asked myself a question; who really knows a school better than anyone else? The answer seemed obvious: the student. With this in mind, I was fortunate enough to make the acquaintance of Mr. Phillip C. Spirit, who is currently the oldest high-school student in the country. He, better than anyone else, is qualified to tell the story of Penn Charter. The following pages contain excerpts from his journals, and it is my hope that you will find his words both inspiring and informative.

30 July, 1689

My name is Philip Charles Spirit, though most of my schoolmates call me PC. My family arrived in Pennsylvania just three months ago, following a long sea journey. My father owns a small apothecary, and it was decided that I should go to school in order that I might enter someday into the field of law. Today, I began attending a new school. It is called the Public Grammar School, and I am led to understand that it was founded by none other than William Penn himself. There are only twelve of us attending the newly formed school, but already we have become good friends. There is a kind of camaraderie which seems to be ingrained in the very foundations of the school. The Headmaster's name is George Kieth. Mr. Kieth is a stern man, but he knows a great deal and he is wonderful to learn from. He is, as we all are, a Quaker, and he is very devout about his religion. He has told us stories of his adventures in England; he even went to jail for his beliefs. Right now I am studying science, geography, mathematics, navigation, and surveying, as well as Latin, Greek, and, Hebrew. No other school teaches so many subjects, and I feel that I can not help but learn much while I am going to Mr. Kieth's school. I truly feel that I will enjoy attending the Public Grammar School, and I can but wonder at what great things lie in store for the future.



19 September, 1701

12 October, 1697

Today, something very special happened at school. We were told that the Philadelphia Monthly Meeting, who originally helped to create the school, announced that they would raise money so that poorer children could attend school. Robert Wade, one of the most influential and respected citizens of the colony, has already made a donation, and I cannot help but feel a great sense of pride at the notion that my school will soon be helping to educate those less fortunate than myself. It is my sincerest hope that this will continue as a tradition of this, and many other schools.

12 August, 1698

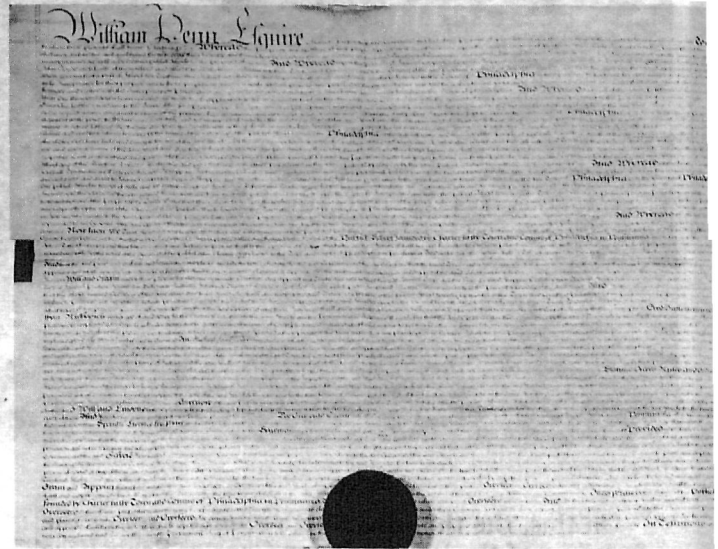
... I can't say as I have any great affection for our new second master, Mr. Pastorius. The running joke is that Mr. Pastorius is anything but pastoral, and I would suppose that that about sums him up. Where Mr. Makin is always willing to help out a student, Mr. Pastorius seems to find pleasure in making life hard on us all. In fact, it was he who, for no great reason, beat a friend of mine by the name of Israel Pemberton quite severely. Israel has since left the school, and it was with sadness that I saw him go. It seems most wrong for this sort of thing to happen at school. In the past I was always willing to approach Mr. Makin for help in my studies, and he did readily give whatever aid I was requiring. I had come to think of that as something common to the school, and it distresses me to see that Mr. Pastorius doesn't seem to follow our Headmaster's fine example.

15 May, 1700

... The new school has moved to a new location now. It is located on Fourth Street, between Chestnut and Walnut, and it is much larger than the old building on Strawberry Alley. I feel certain that it will remain here for many years. It is a good location, and a wonderful building. The masters still pester us for not using the correct singular forms when addressing one another. It boggles my mind that one should be so concerned with whether we say "thee" and "thou" rather than "you". I do not understand it, but I suppose that it is probably important to my parents so I will do my best to keep my speaking in the correct form.

... I am happy to say that the school has a new charter this year, coming from none other than Mr. William Penn himself. In the charter, Mr. Penn calls the school the "Publick School Founded By Charter", and this name seems to me to be more distinctive than simply, "Publick School" as Mr. Markham had dubbed it when he chartered Overseers in 1697.

9 October, 1711

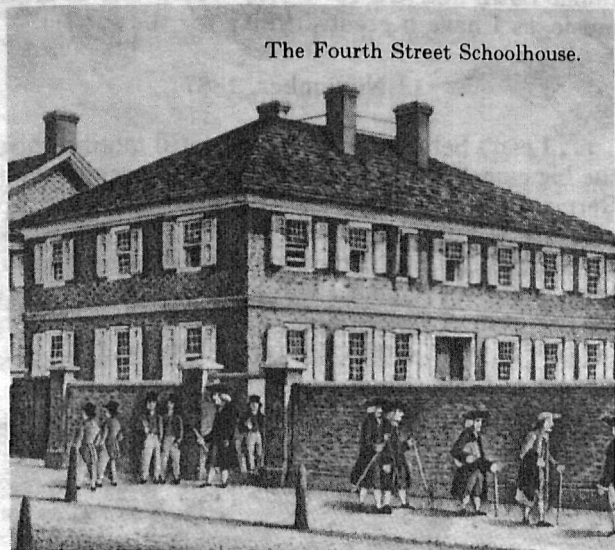
... We have another new charter this year. Now Mr. Penn has decided to remove the requirement that all Overseers be Quakers. I think that Mr. Penn has made a very sensible decision. If the Overseers are religiously diverse, then their individual opinions on school matters will be equally as diverse. This leads to alternative ideas being suggested with respect to the way in which the school operates. I think that this diversity can only serve to make the school a better instrument for doling out a wide-reaching education.

10 November, 1733

... It is a sad time about the school now. Just last week, Thomas Makin, our beloved former Headmaster, passed away. He fell from a dock and drowned in the Delaware river. I have taken the news quite badly; Mr. Makin had been almost like a second father to me. I remember the times that he had taken extra time to aid me with my Greek studies. He was always willing to help any student, and he shall be fondly remembered by all.

18 October, 1744

... I really like the new school building. It has two floors and FOUR rooms; each of them having large windows. This is a drastic change from the old building, which had one room with but one window. I enjoy being able to have sunlight in the classroom very much, and I truly think that it helps one to concentrate better on the business of learning. There are now over fifty students at this school; that is more than four times the number of students attending when the school first opened.



14 April, 1748

... I am again taking Latin now. After Mr. Benzet had become Headmaster, there had been no Latin taught for a number of years. This year, however, Mr. Willan, the new Latin Master, was hired. The school has been steadily growing, and now all the rooms are being filled. We have another new teacher this year as well. His name is Mrs. Birchall, and she is the first teacher at the school to be a woman. Mrs. Birchall teaches the girls primarily, though they study in a different room from the boys, but I would not be surprised if, at some point not too far in the future, women taught boys as well as girls...

... I like Headmaster Benzet. He is a very kind and gentle man, never resorting to corporal punishment. As an example of his rather odd discipline, he didn't punish two of my classmates after they played a stupid prank. They had tied a mouse to a tiny pillory, and put it on Mr. Benzet's desk with a note saying that the mouse had stolen cheese. Instead of paddling the two boys, Mr. Benzet rewarded them for not killing the mouse.

Robert Proud, Master.



15 January, 1767

... Mr. Proud [the present Headmaster] has just received some more things from his friend in England. He is always getting new books and scientific equipment which he shows to us. Now he has a new microscope which makes everything look bigger. He let us all look at his finger through the microscope, and it was a truly amazing sight. I was fascinated by the microscope, and I hope that one day I might even own one myself.

23 March, 1767

... Today, one of My friends in Mr. Todd's English school received a brutal paddling. Everyone knows that Mr. Todd is a very stern man who relies on corporal punishment to maintain discipline. Some have even described him as a "Masterly Flogger." I think that I, for one, much prefer Mr. Benzet's mode of discipline to that of Mr. Todd.

11 June, 1777

... I can't believe the nerve of this Sam Fox guy. He is now printing his own school newspaper! He calls it the *Student Gazette*, and he says he wants to print articles about the school as well as the news of Philadelphia. A SCHOOL NEWSPAPER? He must be kidding. Who does he think that he is fooling, everyone knows that it is just an attempt to impress the teachers. Who does this guy think he is? Some kind of junior Ben Franklin?

At this point, Mr. Spirit's journals were lost, and most of the period between the late eighteenth and late nineteenth centuries are undocumented by him. This seems to be a reflection of the school, as this period marked a decline in enrollment: primarily a result of the opening of various other schools in Philadelphia, including Central High. The only entry of Mr. Spirit's that we were able to find is a fragment of one dating from somewhere in the 1830's which reads as follows.

"... don't know what's going on anymore. It seems as if all the students are leaving for other schools. The school had over a hundred students, and now there are only a fourth as many, I hope this turns around soon as I..."

Mr. Spirit's journals pick up again in the late nineteenth century, during the period known as the "Second Golden Age" of Penn Charter.

15 September, 1875

... I am glad that the school has reopened and is again growing strong. The school has gone to an all-male format now, and the school building, located on Twelfth Street is very nice. I'm not sure exactly how I feel about an all boys school. It seems to me that girls should have the same opportunity to be educated as we do. The official name of the school is now The William Penn Charter School, and it does sound quite distinctive. We had called the old school Penn Charter on occasion, but now Mr. Penn's name is officially in the name of the school. It is only right that he should be so recognized, for without his support, the school never would have gotten where it is today. I like the new Headmaster, Mr. Jones. He is a very knowledgeable man, and I am sure he will teach us a great deal.

7 April, 1882

... The school's new publication, the *Penn Charter Magazine*, is doing quite well. It gives a report of what we are doing at school, telling about all the events that take place. It also has a listing of the best students, and I hope that one day my name will be on that list. I really enjoy the new building. I like the athletic equipment, and, this year, I want to run in the track events which we hold at the University of Pennsylvania. There are so many subjects now. I enjoy studying literature and art as well as the traditional Latin and Greek. I also would like to study music, as I have a great affinity for the subject.

12 November, 1887

... I can't believe it. People are still talking about the big game! It was the first football game between Germantown Academy and Penn Charter, and the school was bubbling over the prospects for weeks beforehand. In fact, I now want to join the football team next year, so that I will have an opportunity to try to win next year's game. I can only imagine that our rivalry with Germantown Academy will last for a long, long time.

9 June, 1892

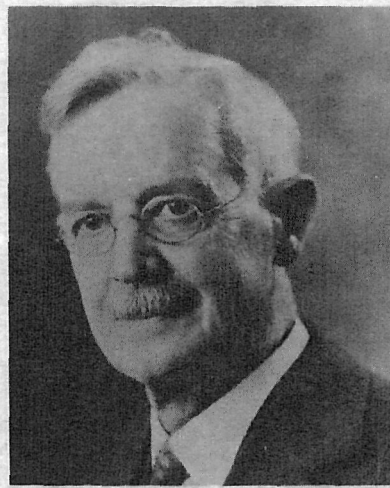
... I like this new idea that Mr. Isaac Porter has come up with. He proposed that we divide the school into two teams and have a "Color War." This "Color War" would consist of a year long tallying of points for the two teams. Points could be won by a student in many ways. Academic excellence, participation in certain activities, and of course athletic excellence would all earn points for a student's team, and the scoring is very complex indeed. I wonder how they will ever be able to keep track of all the points? I like the idea, but the term "Color War" seems a bit un-Quaker to me. Perhaps calling it something else would be a good idea. I don't like the idea of being in any sort of "war" with my friends. I do feel, however, that the event is a good idea, and I hope it becomes a long standing tradition at Penn Charter.

6 October, 1894

... I joined another club today. This one was the mandolin club. We all get together to play our mandolins (and some other instruments like lutes and guitars) once a week. I have always liked the mandolin, and now I find it fun to be with other people who like to play music. There are so many other activities though, one can join the mandolin club, the debate society, creative writing organizations and much more. Another activity which is very popular is the Literary Society. The Literary Society meets to discuss literature, as the name of the organization would imply. However, the Literary Society does much more than that. The members put on dramatics productions which are sometimes held at the Academy of Music. I have seen some of the productions, and the members of the Society are excellent thespians indeed. It is a great improvement over the rather rigid curriculum of the past. The type of person that attends Penn Charter has certainly changed over the years. Now, almost all the students come from more well-to-do families, rather than the more middle class families. This hasn't seemed to affect the personalities of the students much though. Everyone who comes here seems to acquire a new personality. People seem to be more honest and trusting at Penn Charter than I have found anywhere else in my daily life, and this pleases me to no end.

11 September, 1903

... Today, Mr. Jones took us all to a site which he hopes will one day hold our school building. This one is better than all the rest combined. It is an estate called *Pinehurst*. There are many playing fields, and I can only imagine that the sports we play will improve there. I play on the cricket team, and I must say that the new cricket field would be a great improvement over the one we use now. "Dickie", er, that is Mr. Jones always comes to our cricket matches, as well as all other sporting events. He encourages us to support all the Penn Charter athletic teams, and now many people can be seen at each game. The

school has really grown. I never imagined that there would be so many students here at once. I only hope that the school continues to grow at this pace. I also hope that the school will move to *Pinehurst* soon. The present school building is becoming more and more crowded. Recently, the rooms have been packed to such an extent that it makes learning difficult. The boys tend to become rowdy when kept in such tight quarters, and I firmly believe that many problems of rambunctiousness will be ended if we move to a bigger building. Another problem exists with the current school location. It is very difficult to get over to the playing fields from the school. For example, if one wishes to participate in an athletic activity, one must take a long train ride from the Twelfth Street building to the Germantown playing fields. On some occasions, it has been necessary for Mr. Jones to rent a train to take the whole school to a game. This too would be simplified if the school would move to *Pinehurst*.

9 February, 1917

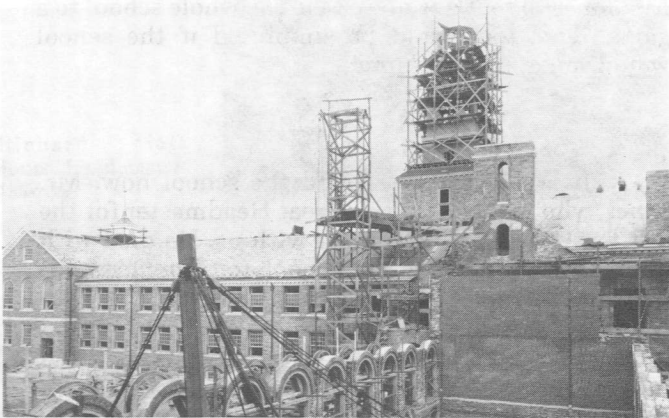
... It is a sad time around the school now. Mr. Jones, who had been such a great Headmaster for the last few decades, is no longer with us. He died with his dream of moving the school to *Pinehurst* unfulfilled. Although we hold all of our sporting contests on the fields of the estate, we have not moved the actual school there, although I hope we will, and soon.



18 March, 1922

... Today, I and some of my friends were standing together talking during lunch when Mr. Gummere began to talk to us. He seemed genuinely interested in what we thought, and it appeared that he was trying to get us to say what we really thought about the subject at hand. This is one of the qualities that I most admire about Mr. Gummere; he is always willing to listen to one's thoughts and opinions. Mr. Gummere treats us all like intelligent adults, which is what this school has made us. I think that it's great that the Headmaster takes such an interest in the thoughts and opinions of his students. He supports us in our sporting endeavours as well, yet he isn't overly concerned with winning championships. He says that it is important to have everyone participating in some form of athletic activity, rather than concentrating on just those who are extremely gifted athletically.

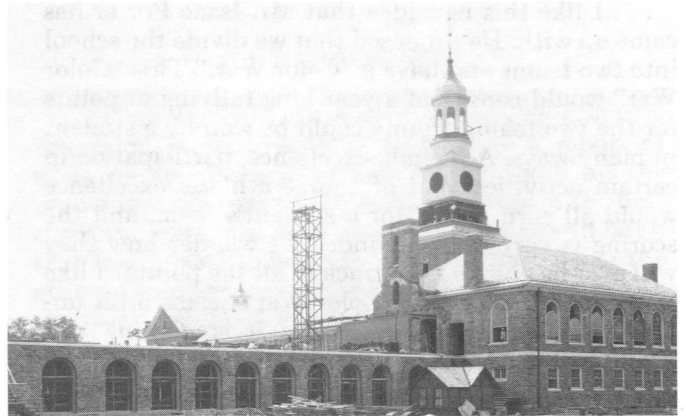
*below*, The gymnasium, 1924, standing alone at Pinehurst by the track oval; *bottom*: Main building construction, June, 1925, looking northwest.



8 September, 1925

... I am glad that we have finally moved into the new building on the *Pinehurst* estate. It is really a beautiful building, with big windows and many classrooms. It seems easier to learn here than in the more central area of the Philadelphia. This is because the city had become quite noisy and dirty of late, what with the streetcars and even the odd automobile. The Germantown site is much cleaner and quieter. However, I sort of wish that the school had moved farther out into the suburbs so that we would be even more isolated from the hectic rush of the city. It is a marvelous location though, and I am glad that the school

has moved here. My only regret is the fact that Mr. Jones isn't here to see the move. He had always wanted to move the school here, but his death came before that could be accomplished. I have recently decided to again join the football team next year. Although many people say that I am much too old, I feel just the opposite. I may be a bit older than the average student, but I love sports, and I can't wait till we play Germantown Academy again.

2 January, 1935

... Mr. Gummere left us in favor of a position at Harvard university, and so "Doc" Strong was appointed temporary Headmaster. "Doc" is a great English teacher. He has taught me to appreciate modern poetry. The only thing I don't like about him is his standard lateness punishment. When one is late, as I all too often am, "Doc" makes you memorize and recite Kipling's "Recessional." I have now learned it by heart, and I doubt that I will ever forget a single word of it, thanks to "Doc" Strong.

11 December, 1947

... I am still reflecting on the significance of the decision to admit colored students to Penn Charter. In my mind it was a decision which was a long time in coming. I am glad that the school will be "color-blind" in its admissions program because it comes as a reaffirmation of basic Quaker Philosophy. It reflects the feeling that there is that of God within all people, and therefore no person should be treated as anything less than an equal.



15 October, 1959

... The newly implemented "Honor System" seems a good thing to me. It forces students and faculty alike to have trust in one another, and it gives the students in particular a certain added responsibility, not just for one's self, but for one's neighbor as well.



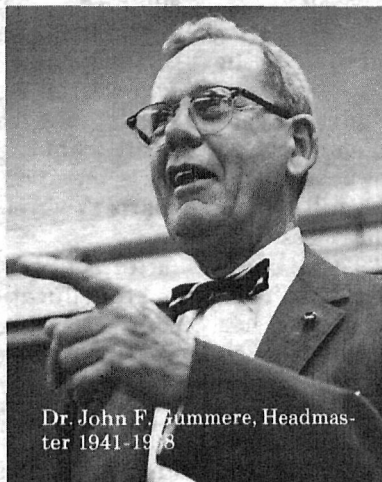
above, the "New Gym"; right, the Assembly Room

24 January, 1966

... This season, the basketball and swimming teams have moved into the new gym complex. The new gym is much larger than the old one, and this means that more people can attend basketball games and swim meets. I'm glad of this because now I will be able to go to basketball games without having to crowd into those small bleachers in the old gym.

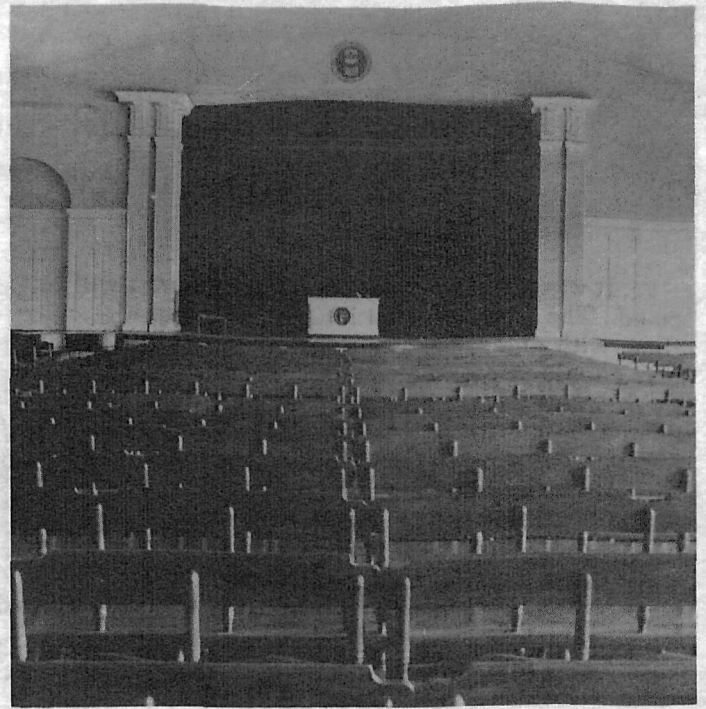
21 April, 1966

... Today, I was able to see the new computer terminal for the first time. Penn Charter is the first school in the area to install a computer, and I guess that this, more than anything else, impressed on me the fact that Penn Charter is really progressing into the modern age.



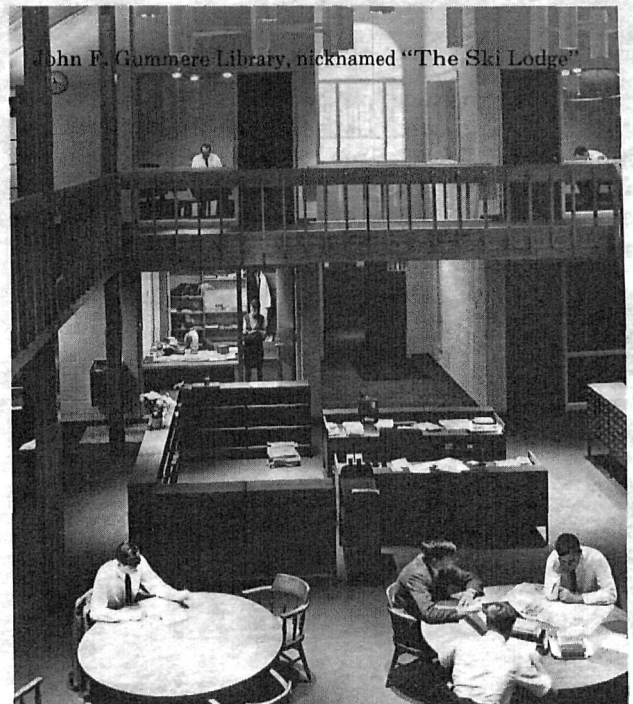

... Today, we had Friends Meeting. Recently, Meeting has become much more interesting than in years past. Instead of silence throughout the Meeting, broken sometimes by a comment from the Headmaster, people, faculty and students alike, are speaking more often. This is in a large part due to the efforts of Dr. Gummere. He has encouraged people to stand up and speak their minds when the spirit so moves them. I for one feel that this enhances our weekly Meeting.



27 May, 1967

... Everyone is still saddened by Dr. Gummere's decision to retire at the end of this year. Although he is leaving the school (if that can ever be truly said of anyone) the memory of John F. Gummere will live on for as long as Penn Charter remains. His remembrance will be prolonged in part by the fact that the new library was dedicated in his name; and for years to come, the John F. Gummere Library will stand as a testament to this great man.



15 September, 1980

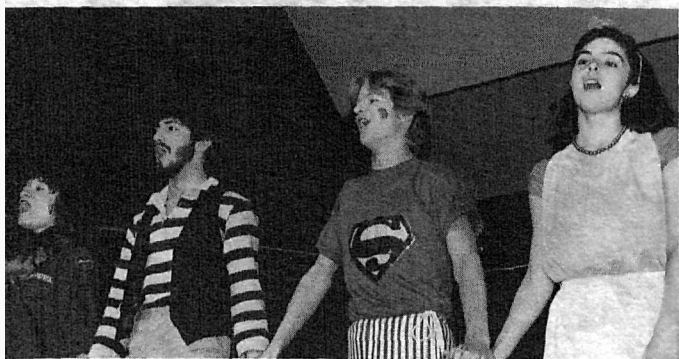
... It was just announced that Penn Charter will go co-ed. The girls will be integrated one grade at a time, with one class leading the way for all the others. The decision, which I consider to be a sensible, progressive idea, has sparked much controversy among students and faculty. Many people are saying that it is a breach of tradition, but I can only say that Penn Charter didn't become all-male until 1875, and this means that more than half of the school's nearly three hundred years of existence have been spent as co-educational. Admittedly the girls and boys studied separately in the early days of the school, but they were still admitted and allowed to attend this institution.

14 September, 1976

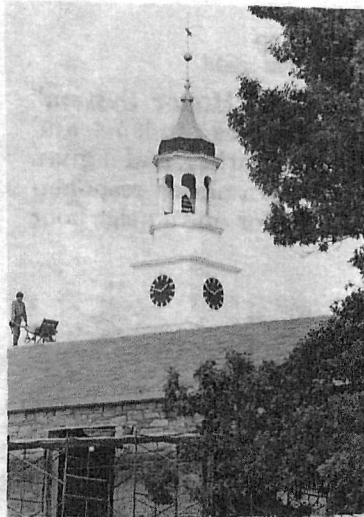
... Mr. Braxton has left his position as Headmaster, and our new Headmaster, Mr. [later Dr.] Earl J. Ball, addressed us today. Mr. Ball has entered the school on the bicentennial of our great nation, and I for one see it as a new beginning. Penn Charter also has another new beginning this year. There is a new building for the Lower School. Now students from kindergarten through fifth grade will study in the new building while students from the sixth through twelfth grades will remain in the original building. For a school which is so tied to the history of the United States, it seems appropriate that when everyone else is looking to the past, we should look to the future.

10 November, 1983

... The Dramatics Society has just put on a production of the musical *Godspell*. This production is, without a doubt, one of the best in the history of the Society. The performers show a tremendous amount of talent, and it will be a hard task for the Dramatics Society to better this performance in the future.

15 November, 1986

... Today, the 100th Penn Charter/Germantown Academy football game was held. Our rivalry with GA is the longest lasting and oldest one of its kind in the United States, and it is with pride that I say that we beat GA 28 to 18!

25 June, 1987

This will be the last entry I make in this journal, which is already as thick as all of my textbooks combined. I am leaving the school, in whatever sense I can leave it, for bigger, and perhaps better, things. After almost three hundred years of high school, it is a time for me to move on. As I think back now, remembering fondly many names and faces and places, I am led to reflect on what it means to attend Penn Charter: I think it means many things, but above all, it can be summed up with one word, pride: pride in our accomplishments, pride in our heritage, and pride in the future greatness represented by the younger classes. It is a special feeling, one that few people ever get to experience: a feeling that separates a Penn Charter student from the crowd. I think it was best expressed by a member of the class of '89, who will be Penn Charter's three hundredth graduating class.

"To me, Penn Charter is not just a place to spend time. It isn't just a tool for education, or a social club, although it has certain aspects of both. No, Penn Charter is much more. It is an idea, a concept almost three hundred years old which is based on two fundamental truths: that every person has that of God within them, and that every person should be respected as an individual. I think that it is these two truths which have allowed Penn Charter truly to be a community, almost a family, rather than an institution."

matter how or where Schuggy has entered our lives he has done it with a style and amiability all his own.



## Edward L. Rachofsky

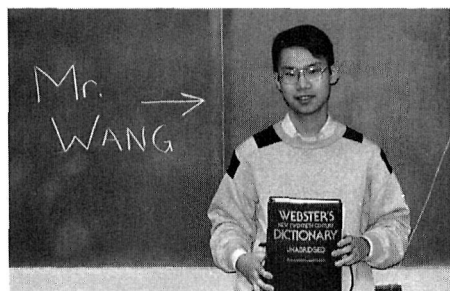

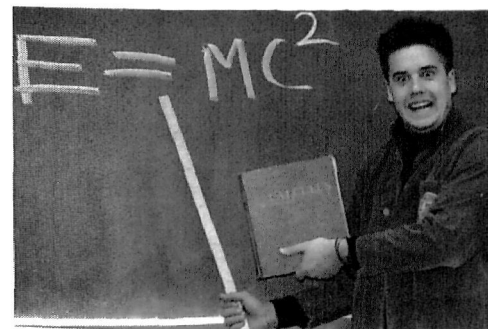


## George Q. Wang

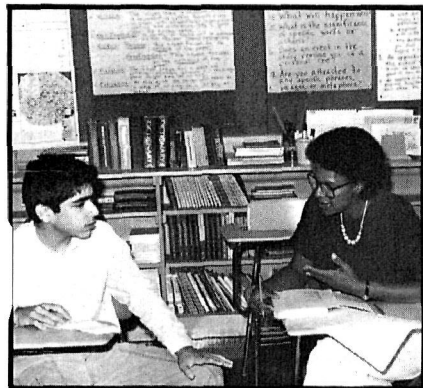
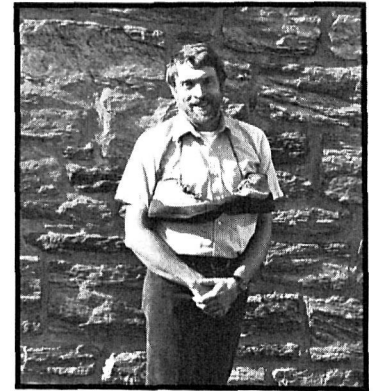
## Stephen A. Bonnie

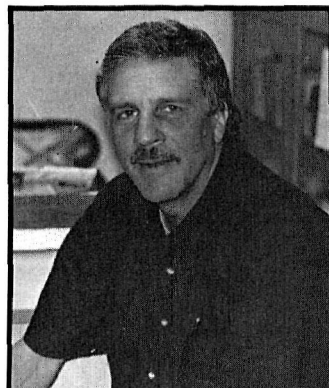
## Frederick W. Huntington

## Cheryl Irving

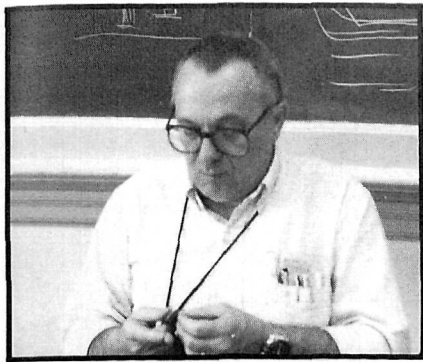

## Joseph S. Perrott

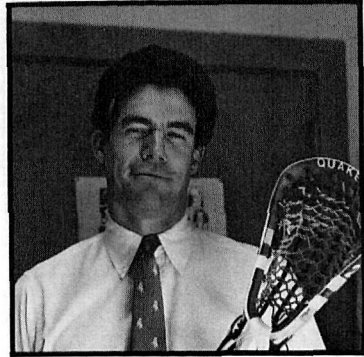
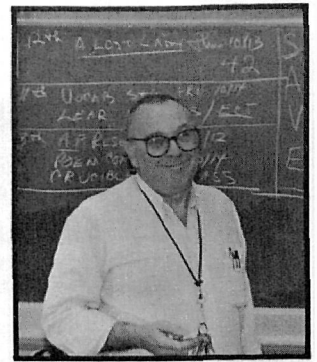

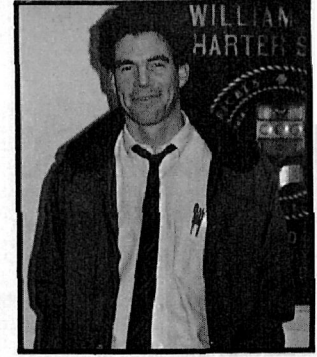
## John R. Schug

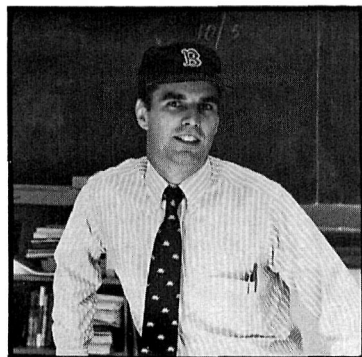
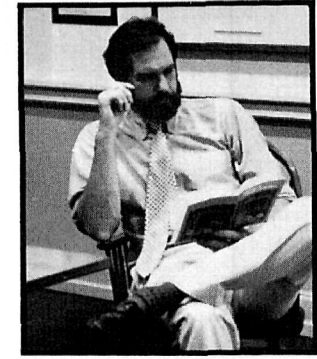
## Christopher Teare

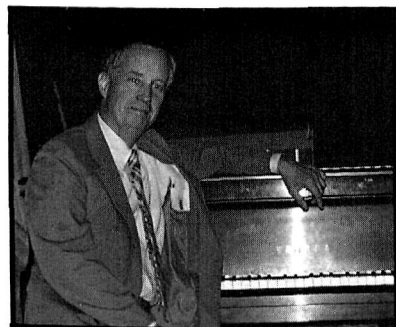
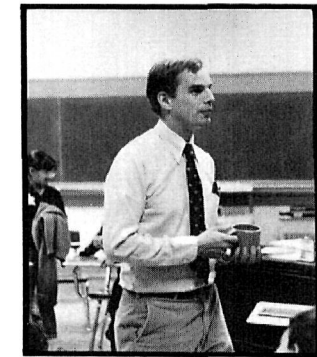
## Stephen H. Watters

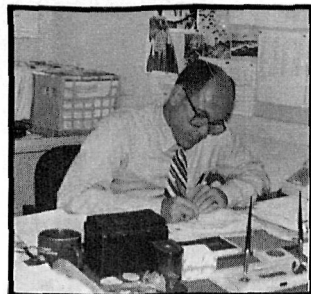

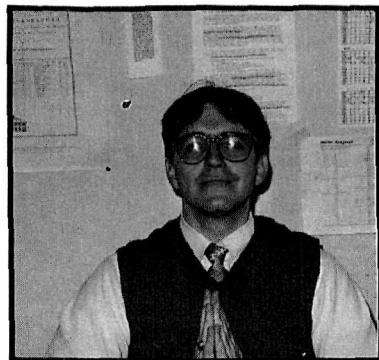
**Robert A. Bovee**

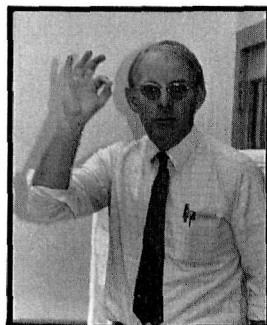
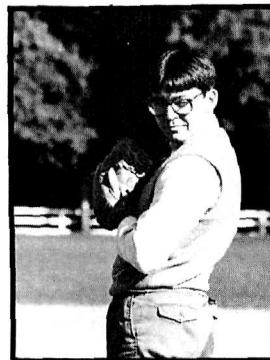
**Allan B. Brown**

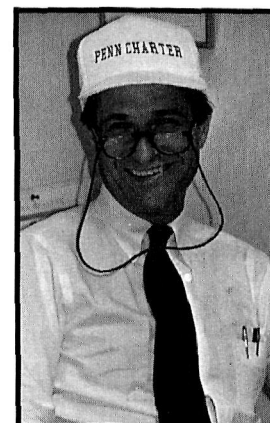
**Jack D.B. Coleman**

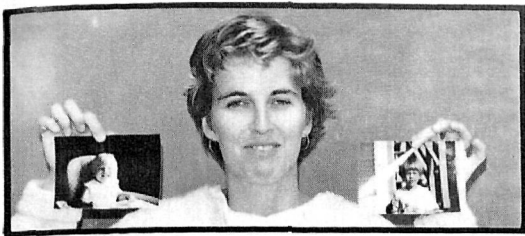


**Jacob A. Dresden**

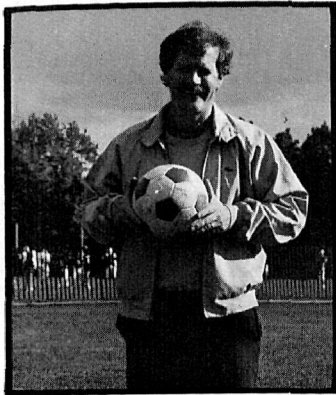
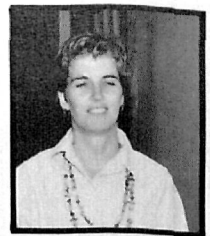






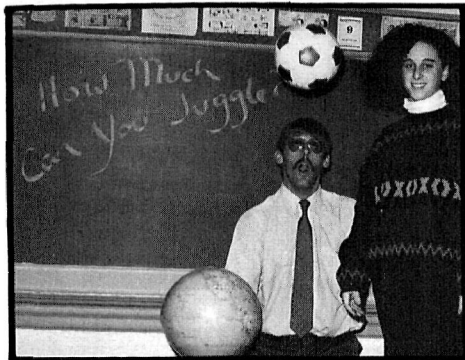
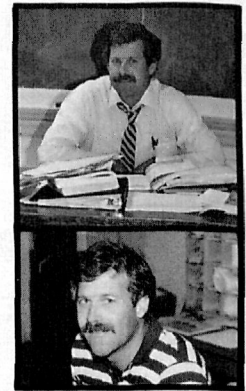
**Lisa A. LeFort**

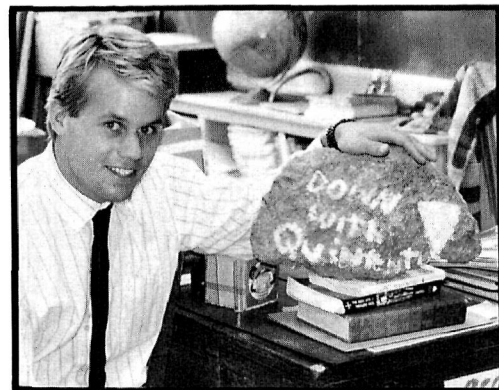
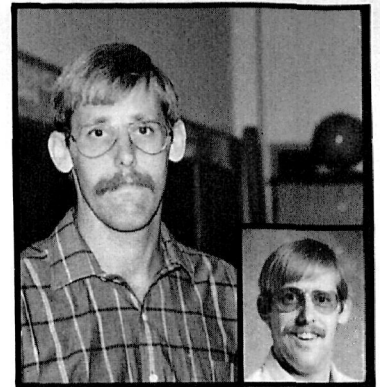
**Edwin H. Marks**

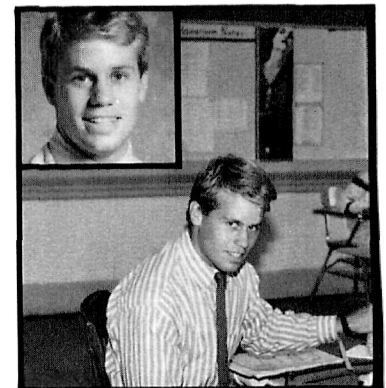
**Hugo D. Smith**

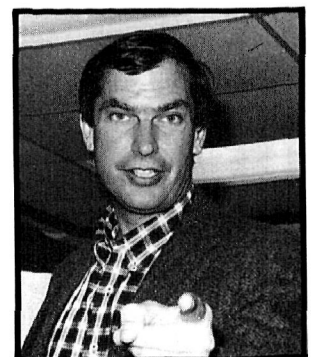


## Religion Department

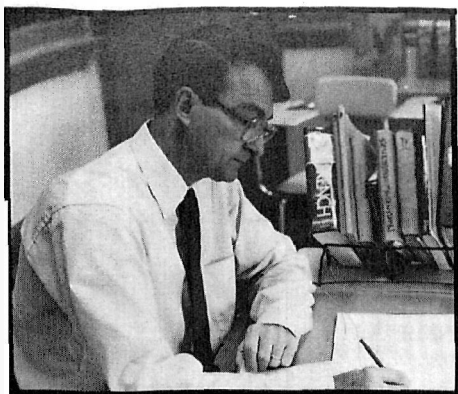
**Alfred K. LaMotte**

# Language Department



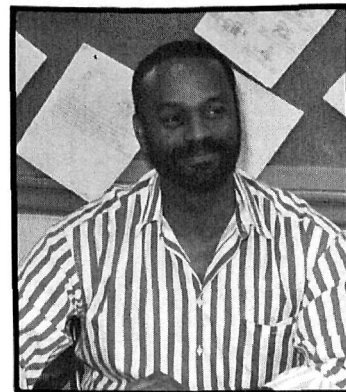
## John F. Arts

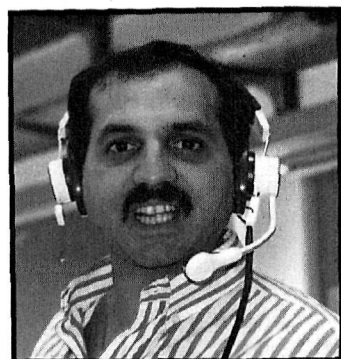
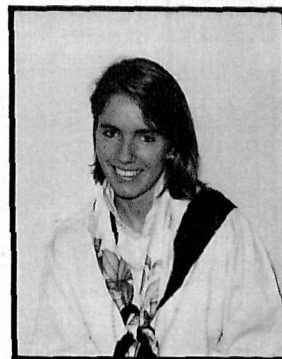
## Donald T. Jacques

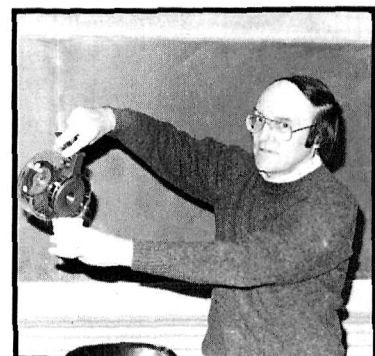
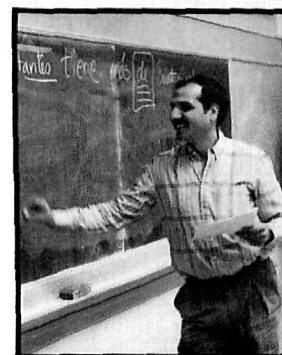
## Julia M. Neidecker

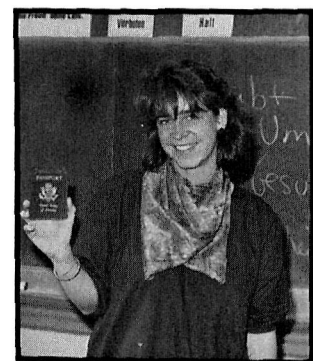
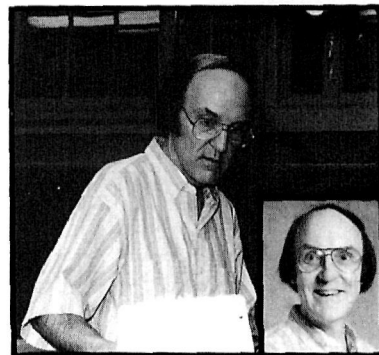
## August C. Puleo

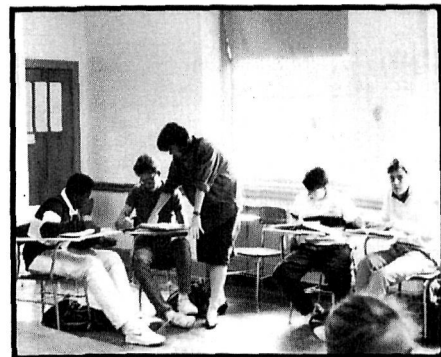
## Richard R. Smith

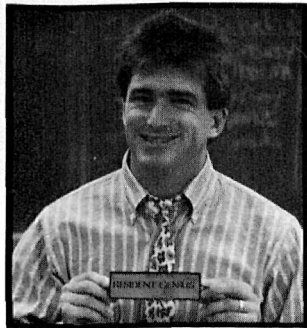

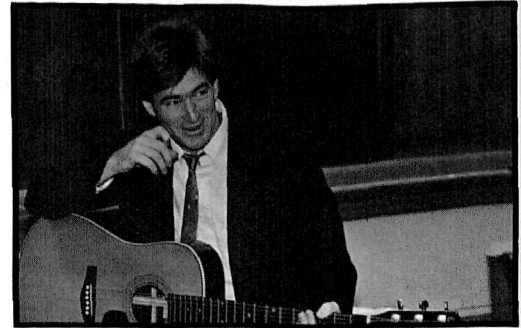
**Pam R. Ball**

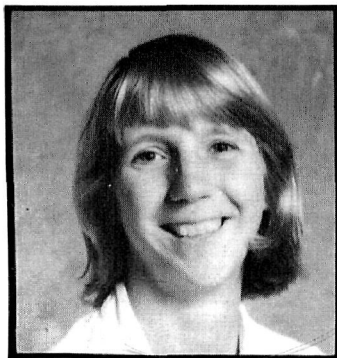
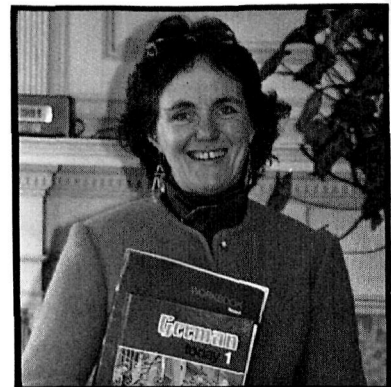
**Charles H. Brown**

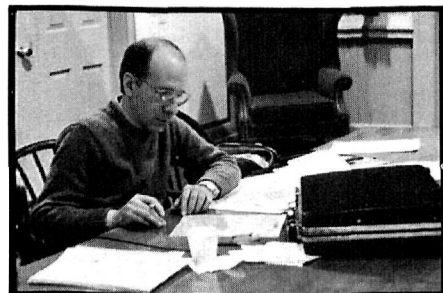
**Nancy Donaghy**

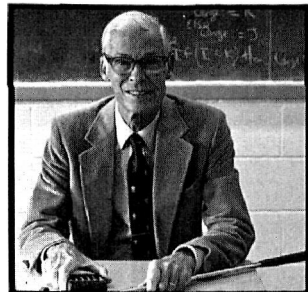
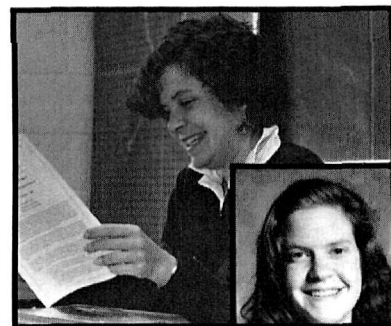
## Charles W. Hitschler III

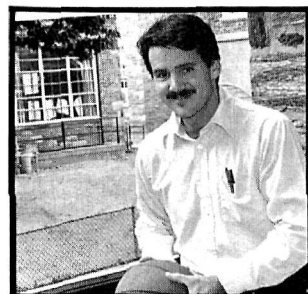
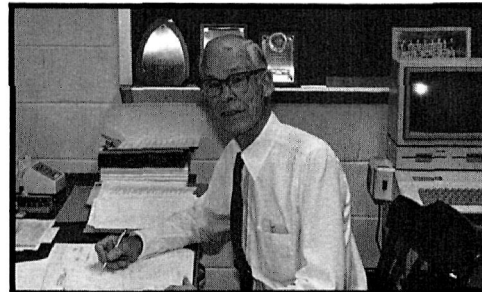
## Lisa Klein

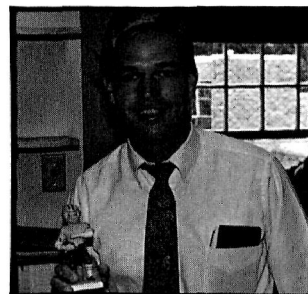
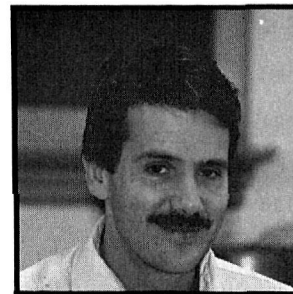
## M. Albert Linton, Jr.

# Science Department



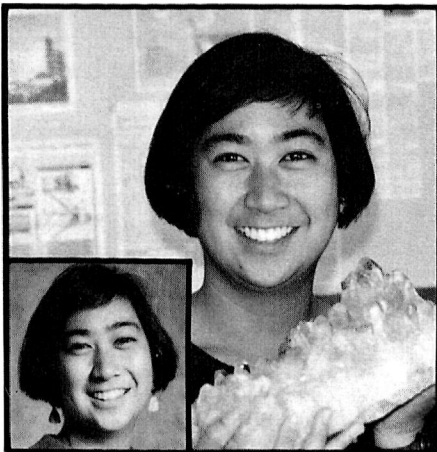
## Andrea T. Fossati

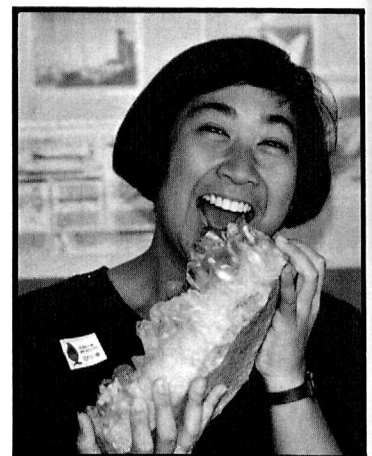
## Elizabeth A. Glascott

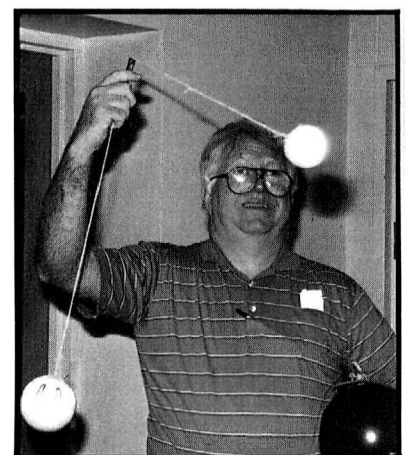
## Karen Horikawa

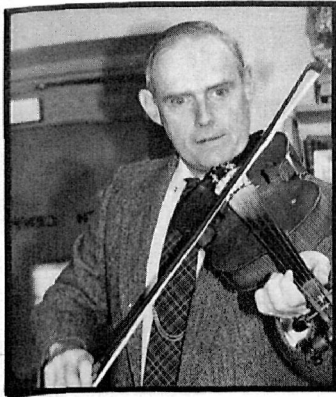


## Thomas S. Katman

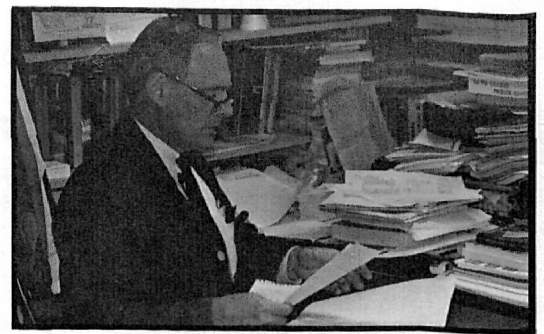






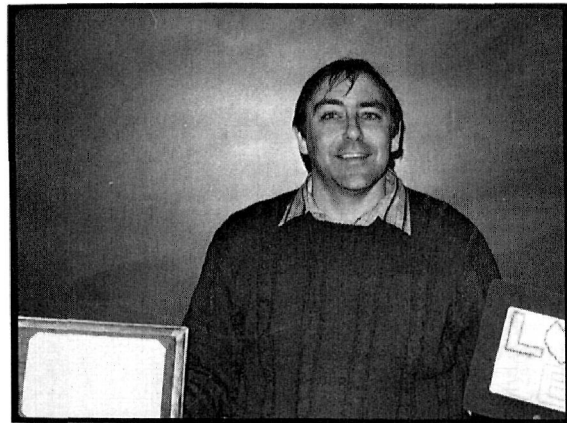
## T. David Kuehn

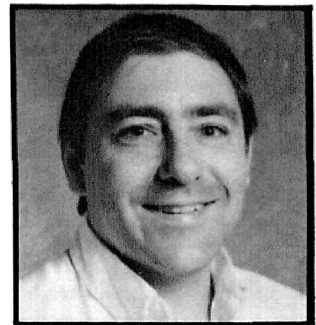
## Joanne Maule-Schmidt

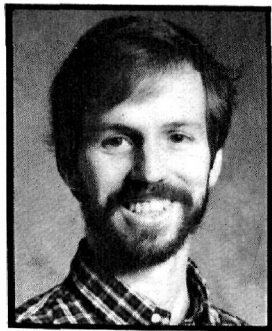

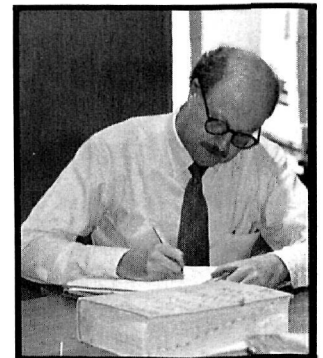

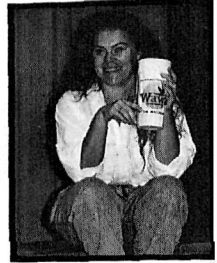
## Elizabeth B. Darby

## Susan L. Winn

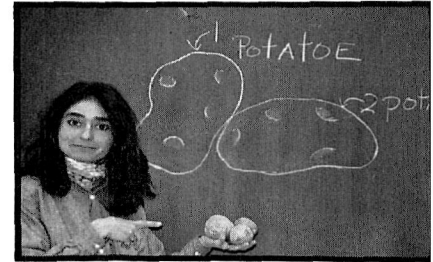

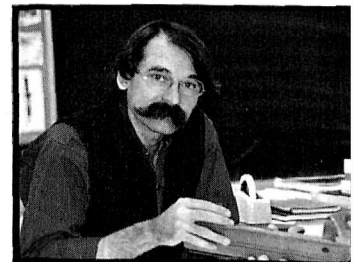
## Mary A. Gordon

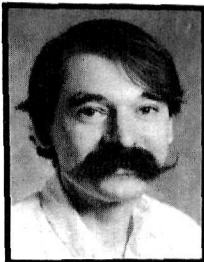
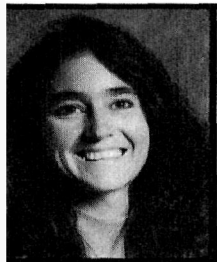
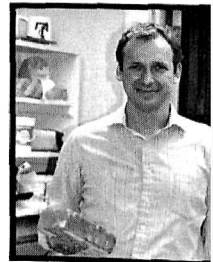
## Randy W. Granger

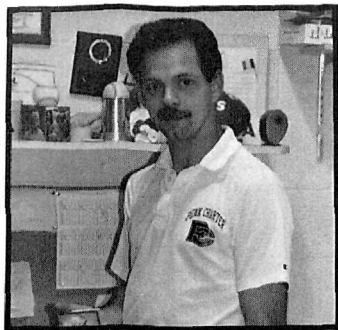


## Bruce Singer

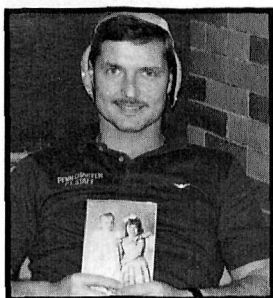
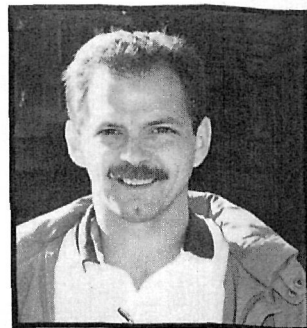


# Physical Education Department



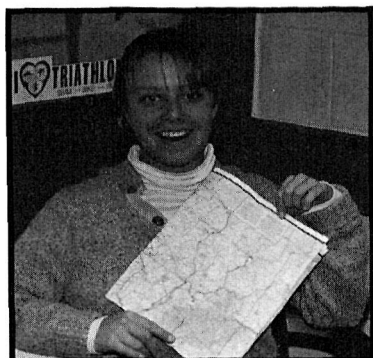
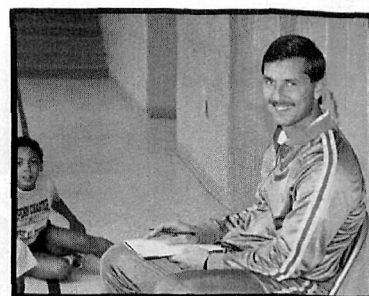
**Paul S. Butler**

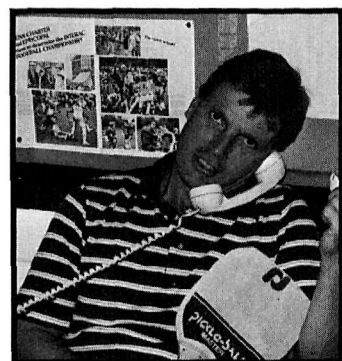
**Valdis A. Erdmanis**

# Happy Birthday, Penn Charter!

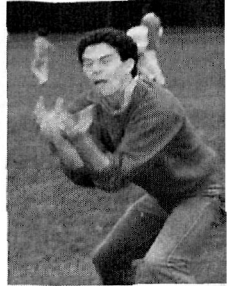

## To The Class Of 1989

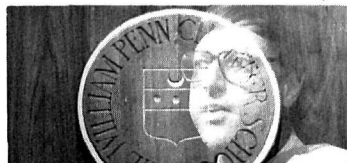
Since you entered Penn Charter, you have heard repeatedly of your status as the Tricentennial class. In fact, some of you have heard about it so much that you begin to get a dazed expression when the word "Tricentennial" reaches your ears. Why is the Tricentennial important? I believe that the events of the Tricentennial have given us the opportunity to underline many of the core values of the school. The tradition of the school, the strength of the school, and its prominence in the community only have meaning to you as the school has enriched your individual lives.

The Academic Convocation, a Tricentennial event which is reported on these pages, is an example of an activity which speaks to many of the important values of the school. The academic garb worn by the faculty in the academic procession was a visual representation of the strength of the intellectual training of the faculty. The presence of juniors and seniors was an indication of the ongoing nature of the academic tradition at the school and of the school's dedication to current students as our primary responsibility. The presence of forty college and independent school heads from around the country testified to the position of respect that the school enjoys nationally. The very nature of Vartan Gregorian's address exemplified the school's belief in challenging students to engage in serious academic and ethical deliberation. 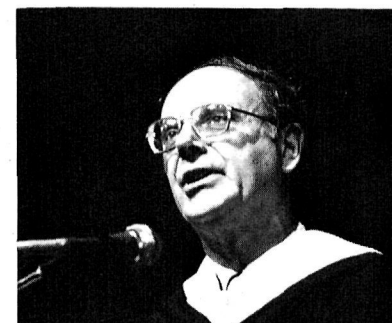
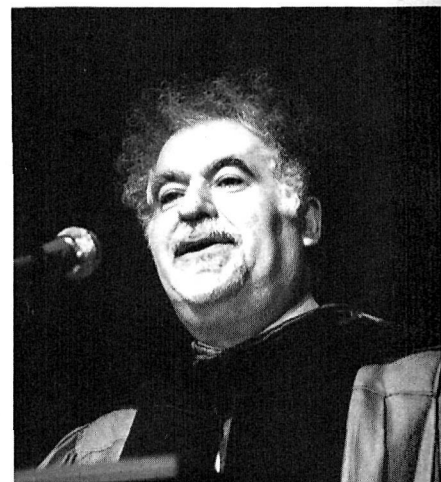
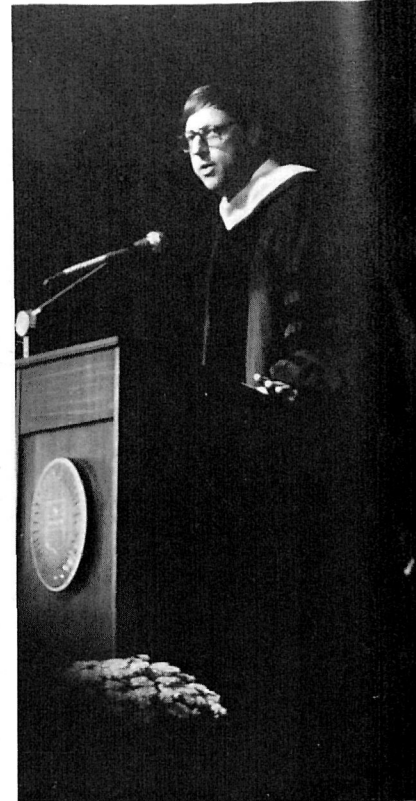

Finally, you will be the judge of that. You go from Penn Charter with our genuine affection and ongoing commitment.



# The Great Debate — 1988!

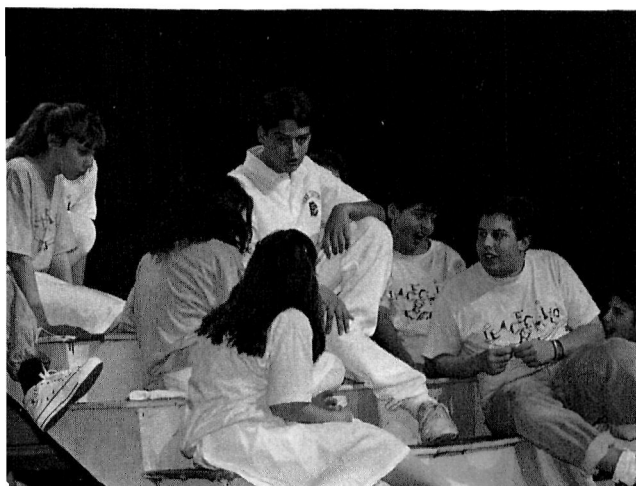

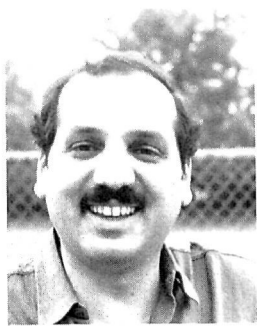
## Hi's 'N' 'Bye's

Janet Sobolewski has been with PC for fourteen years, bringing energy and creativity to the third grade. She and her family are moving to South Florida.



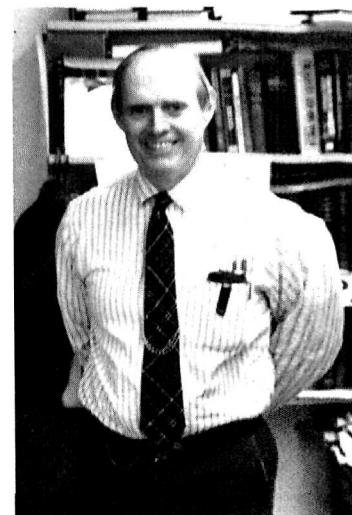
Although Andrea Fossati was only here for a year, she brought a lot to the Science Department. She aspires to a career in medicine.
